The Kingdoms of This World

Select Readings on *Human Governments* (Part 1)

"Again, the devil taketh Him up into an exceeding high mountain, and showeth Him all the kingdoms of the world, and the glory of them; and saith unto Him, 'All these things will I give Thee, if Thou wilt fall down and worship me" (Matthew 4:8-9).

RESIDENT ALIENS

Scripture ... teaches that we are to view ourselves as soldiers stationed in a foreign country and, thus are not to let ourselves get overly entangled in civilian affairs ["the affairs of this life" – II Timothy 2:4] ... Whatever country we may naturally belong to, Paul says, we are to remember always that our real citizenship is in heaven (c.f. Philippians 3:20). Whatever opinions we have about how to solve society's problems, we are to remember always that we cannot serve two masters (Luke 16:13).

Our allegiance, therefore, can never be to any version of the kingdom-of-the-world, however much better we may think it is than other versions of the kingdom-of-the-world. Our allegiance is to our heavenly Father, whose country we belong to and into whose family we've been adopted (Romans 8:29; Galatians 1:2; 6:10; Ephesians 1:4-5) ... We are to see ourselves as "alien residents."

The field of candidates for President has dwindled from a couple dozen only a few months ago, to three major recognized contenders. This past week former President Bill Clinton came to an area high school to speak at a political rally for his wife Hillary. It seems that the Presidential political attention has arrived in small town PA.

Since he would be only a few minutes from the house, my wife, my son and I decided to go see the 42nd President of the United States for ourselves; after all none of us had ever seen a President in person before. We were not politically motivated to attend; the last election that I voted in was 1992. It was our interest in history that sent us off to see any former President speak!

We sat only a short distance from him as he spoke; it could be measured in feet. Clyde III took his camera, getting us a great picture of the former Commander-in-Chief for my upcoming book on the subject of Human Government.

Early in my Christian life I was a political activist. I served as a political party youth chairman, coordinating party functions and even working the polls.

A little over 15 years ago I began to see my role very differently in relationship to the power-play scheme perpetuated by the influence of the religious-political world system. The course of this world is currently under the dominion of the "god of this world" (II Corinthians 4:4), he giving governmental power to "whomsoever he will" (Luke 4:5-6).

As believers we are not of this world; we are strangers and foreigners here. Our citizenship is in heaven (Philippians 3:20);¹ our King is the Lord Jesus Christ (I Timothy 1:17; 6:15). For this reason we never see our Lord Jesus Christ, Israel's twelve apostles, or Paul our own apostle involved in the governmental-political arena.

Paul very clearly states that the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, that is to say they are not physical. I cannot help but wonder every time I watch the news if the Body of Christ fully understands this important truth. I watch the world wage a war on terror with physical weapons trying to inflict a mortal blow on enemies who would try to destroy our way of life. Our weapons are not carnal ... are not those of the flesh, not such as the people of the world use. They are not such as are employed by conquerors; nor are they such as people in general rely on to advance their cause. We do not depend on eloquence, or talent, or learning, or wealth, or beauty, or any of the external aids, on which the people of this world rely. They are not such as deriving advantage from any power inherent in themselves, or the weapons, which can be massproduced. Their strength is derived from God alone. But they are mighty through God. They are rendered mighty or powerful by the agency of God. They depend on him for their efficacy. Paul has not here specified the weapons on which he relied; but he had before specified them so that there was no danger of mistake. The following verses state what these weapons are:

"By pureness, by knowledge, by longsuffering, by kindness, by the Holy Ghost, by love unfeigned, by the word of truth, by the power of God, by the armour of righteousness on the right hand and on the left" (II Corinthians 6:6-7).

America: No Favored Nation

The Religious Right argues that, given its rich European and Christian heritage, America has been blessed by God because of its adherence to Judeo-Christian values. They set America apart and above all other nations. This is heresy ... We are no more favored by God than Russia, Cuba, or Brazil. Such thinking is idolatrous ...

Leaders of the Religious Right have waxed eloquent on their belief that America was founded as a "Christian" nation ... But America never was, is not, and very likely never will be a Christian nation ...

"Reclaiming America for Christ" ... presupposes that America was thoroughly Christian at one time and that Christ wants it back. Both presuppositions are wrong ... Study the teachings of Jesus, and you will discover that He never intended His disciples to claim or reclaim nations for Himself ...

The Christians in Uzbekistan do not expect their government to reflect their values. The believers in Egypt and elsewhere do not expect their government to reflect their values. The only people who expect their government to reflect their religious values are countries where religion and politics are synonymous. In Iran, the religious zealots expect the government to reflect Muslim values. But in America, where there is no systemic connection between religion and state, believers somehow expect the government to reflect their values. Are we looking for the Christian equivalent of a Muslim state? Do we want religious clerics dictating what we wear and what we do? ...

We should never expect our government to reflect our values. We should expect them to be hostile. This is what Jesus predicted.

HEALTHY SUSPICION

Far from aligning any version of the kingdom of the world with the kingdom of God, kingdom-of-God participants must retain a healthy suspicion toward every version of the kingdom of the world – especially their own (for here it is most tempting to become idolatrous). After all, on the authority of God's Word, we know that however good a particular government may be by world standards, it is nevertheless strongly influenced by fallen principalities and powers ...

In fact, the kingdom-of-God citizen should know that, far from holding the ultimate answer to the world's problems, even the best versions of the kingdom of the world are part of the world's problem ...

Every version of the kingdom of this world defends itself and advances its cause by rallying the self-interests of its citizens into collective tribal force that makes each citizen willing to kill and be killed for what it believes to be the good of society. It survives and advances by uniting and motivating its subjects around their distinct collective identity, ideals, self-interest, and desire for security – over and against any individuals

or governments whose own tribal ideals, self-interest and desire for security might impinge on or threaten their own. To this end, every version of the kingdom of the world demonizes its enemies when necessary to generate the motivation to go to war and to convince those who must spill blood that their cause is righteous.

MYTH OF A CHRISTIAN NATION

I believe that a significant segment of American evangelicalism is guilty of nationalistic and political idolatry. To a frightful degree, I think, evangelicals fuse the kingdom of God with a preferred version of the kingdom of the world ...

What gives the connection between Christianity and politics such strong emotional force in the U.S.? I believe it is the longstanding myth that America is a Christian nation.

From the start, we have tended to believe that God's will was manifested in the conquest and founding of our country – and that it is still manifested in our actions around the globe. Throughout our history, most Americans have assumed our nation's causes and wars were righteous and just, and that "God is on our side." In our minds – as so often in our sanctuaries – the cross and the American flag stand side by side. Our allegiance to God tends to go hand in hand with our allegiance to country. Consequently, many Christians who take their faith seriously see

themselves as the religious guardians of a Christian homeland. America, they believe, is a holy city "set on a hill," and the church's job is to keep it shining.

For many in America and around the world, the American flag has smothered the glory of the cross, and the ugliness of our American version of Caesar has squelched the radiant love of Christ. Because the myth that America is a Christian nation has led many to associate America with Christ, many now hear the good news of Jesus only as American news, capitalistic news, imperialistic news, exploitive news, anti-gay news, or Republican news. And whether justified or not, many people want nothing to do with any of it.

An Idolatrous Celebration

Shortly after the Gulf War in 1992 I happened to visit a July Fourth worship service at a certain megachurch. At center stage in this auditorium stood a large cross next to an equally large American flag. The congregation sang praise choruses mixed with such patriotic hymns as "God Bless America." The climax of the service centered on a video of a well-known Christian military general giving a patriotic speech about how God has blessed America and blessed its military troops, as evidenced by the speedy and almost "casualty-free" victory "He gave us" in the Gulf War (Iraqi deaths apparently weren't counted as "casualties" worthy of notice). Triumphant military music played in the background as he spoke.

The video closed with a scene of a silhouette of three crosses on a hill with an American flag waving in the background. Majestic, patriotic music now thundered. Suddenly, four fighter jets appeared on the horizon, flew over the crosses, and then split apart. As they roared over the camera, the words "God Bless America" appeared on the screen in front of the crosses.

The congregation responded with roaring applause, catcalls, and a standing ovation. I saw several people wiping tears from their eyes. Indeed, as I remained frozen in my seat, I grew teary-eyed as well – but for entirely different reasons. I was struck with horrified grief.

Thoughts raced through my mind: How could the cross and the sword have been so thoroughly fused without anyone seeming to notice? How could Jesus' self-sacrificial death be linked with flying killing machines? How could Calvary be associated with bombs and missiles? How could Jesus' people applaud tragic violence, regardless of why it happened and regardless of how they might benefit from its outcome? How could the kingdom of God be reduced to this sort of violent, nationalistic tribalism? Has the church progressed at all since the Crusades?

Indeed, I wondered how this tribalistic, militaristic, religious celebration was any different from the one I had recently witnessed on television carried out by the Taliban Muslims raising their guns and they joyfully praised Allah for the victories they believed "he had given them" in Afghanistan? ...

This is the way *all* versions of the kingdom of the world operate.

WAR PERPETUATES HATRED

The recent war on terror that the United States finds itself engaged in has not decreased terrorist activity, but rather has seen it escalate to the highest levels ever known. Bloodshed creates more bloodshed, which creates more hatred, which ensures more violence, and hatred. This is what waging a physical war produces. Its end is never good, and it never brings peace that can last. The United States is not eliminating terrorists, but with every act of violence they create more terrorists, who hate Americans more than the ones who preceded them. The whole world system is fortified against Christ; and the peoples of

the earth have been engaged in little else than in raising and strengthening such strongholds for the space of 6,000 years. The doctrine of grace goes forth against all the combined and concentrated powers of resistance of the whole world; and the warfare is to be waged against every strongly fortified place of error and of sin in the spiritual realm. These strong fortifications of error and of sin are to be battered down and laid in ruins by our spiritual weapons of knowledge, longsuffering, kindness, love, and the Holy Ghost as we have already seen.

THE KINGDOMS OF THE WORLD

"And the Devil, taking Him up into an high mountain, shewed unto Him all the kingdoms of the world in a moment of time. And the Devil said unto Him, All this power will I give Thee, and the glory of them: for that is delivered unto me; and to whomsoever I will I give it. If Thou therefore wilt worship me, all shall be Thine." (Luke 4:5-7).

In Luke 4 the Devil tempted Jesus by showing Him "all the kingdoms of the world" while saying, "All this power will I give Thee, and the glory of them: for that is delivered unto me; and to whomsoever I will I give it. Jesus, of course, would not worship the Devil to acquire these kingdoms. But note: He doesn't dispute the Devil's claim to own them.

Apparently, the authority of all the kingdoms of the world has been given to Satan. It's not clear from this text whether we humans gave the Devil this authority when we surrendered to him in the Garden (Genesis 3) or whether God originally entrusted Lucifer with this authority before he rebelled. What is clear is that, however it came about, God's cosmic archenemy now owns the authority of all versions of the kingdom of the world and gives this authority to whomever he pleases.

This teaching is in various forms found throughout the New Testament ... This kingdom is symbolized as "Babylon" ... Certainly some governments are better than others ... But no earthly kingdom, however good, is exempt from the scriptural teaching that it is a part of "Babylon," a worldwide kingdom ruled by Satan.

Along these lines, Jesus three times refers to Satan as the "prince [ruler] of this world" (John 12:31; 14:30; 16:11). The term "prince [ruler]" was a political term used to denote the highest ruling authority in a given region – and Jesus applied it to Satan over the whole world! Functionally, Satan is the acting CEO of all earthly governments. Paul agrees, for he refers to Satan as "the god [magistrate] of this world" (II Corinthians 4:4) and as "the prince [ruler] of the power of the air" (Ephesians 2:2).

A DIFFERENT KIND OF KINGDOM

Fallen humans tend to identify their own group as righteous and any group that opposes them as evil. If they were not evil, we tend to believe, no conflict would exist. Hence, the only way to end the conflict is to "rid the world of this evil," as President George W. Bush said after the terrorist attack on the World Trade Center. The "good" (our tribe) must extinguish the "evil" (their tribe), using all means necessary, including violence. This is the age-old "myth of redemptive violence."

CHRISTIANS IN THE MILITARY

"Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil speaking, be put away from you, with all malice: and be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you. Be ye therefore followers of God, as dear children; And walk in love, as Christ also hath loved us, and hath given Himself for us an offering and a sacrifice to God for a sweetsmelling savour" (Ephesians 4:31-5:2).

There is an alternative to this ceaseless, bloody merry-go-round: it is the kingdom of God ... It is to live the life of Jesus Christ ... to opt out of the kingdom-of-the-world war machine and manifest a radically different, beautiful, loving way of life. To refuse to kill for patriotic reasons is to show "we actually take our identity in Christ more seriously than our identity with

the empire, the nation-state, or the ethnic terror cell whence we come," as Lee Camp says [Mere Discipleship, page 148.]

So, while I respect the sincerity and courage of Christians who may disagree and feel it their duty to defend their country with violence, I honestly see no way to condone a Christian's decision to kill on behalf of any country – or for any other reason.

ISLAMIC ANIMOSITY

Much of the profound animosity Islamic terrorists feel towards "satanic" America is fueled by a cultural memory of what Christians did to Muslims during the Crusades. Believing that America is a Christian nation, they direct their collective, historically acquired hatred toward it ...

The Christian version of the kingdom of the world was actually the worst version the world has ever seen. For this was the version of the kingdom of the world that did the most harm to the kingdom of God. Not only did it torture and kill, as versions of the kingdom of the world frequently do - it did this under the banner of Christ. If violence and oppression are demonic, violence and oppression "in the name of Jesus" is far more so. The church of Christendom thereby brought disrepute to the name of Christ, associating His kingdom with the atrocities it carried out for centuries. The resistance most Islamic countries have to Christianity today, in fact, is partly to be explained by the vicious behavior of Christians toward Muslims throughout history.

Understanding the Muslim Contempt

Historically, the most prominent of churchordained "just wars" were the crusades of 1095-1291 C.E. The Roman Catholic Church has not given any apology or expression of remorse for the crusades; they are still considered to be just wars. Using "crusade" terminology today shows an utter disregard for the atrocities committed during the crusades and a lack of understanding at the Muslim contempt for "Christian" nations, which became ingrained because of those atrocities. Many historians even take the position that the Crusades actually helped Islam become a viable religion in the Middle East, by uniting Muslims against a common enemy.

Heads of state with heavy Christian populations have used the rhetoric of just war since the term was first used in order to gain favor for military operations. Once a war is declared "just" all moral obligation seemingly disappears and Christians can support and even become combatants for the cause.

The Middle East harbors grudges against Christians and Jews, which date back to the Crusades. Our wars have created a gap, which only the grace of God can bridge. While we may be able to free some Muslims from tyrannical regimes, this good does not counteract the evils and hatred we spawn from our military activities there.
