Due Benevolence

An Introduction to the Doctrine of the Home

(Part XXXVIII) by – Clyde L. Pilkington, Jr.

"Let the husband render unto the wife due benevolence: and likewise also the wife unto the husband" (I Corinthians 7:3).

Paul's marital instruction is very clear: the consummated husband/wife relationship is to function on the basis of a perpetual state of marriage (the uniting as "one flesh").

MARITAL BENEVOLENCE

The covenant (promise) of marriage (physical union), among other things, binds the husband and wife to the act of "benevolence."

The word translated "benevolence" in the King James Version is Strong's Greek Lexicon #2133 eunoia, which is a euphemism for "conjugal duty." While the word translated "due" is #3784, opheilo, meaning "to owe... to be under obligation." Thus the husband and wife are under a covenant of obligation to conjugal duty (sexual responsibility).

The husband is responsible by the covenant of marriage to "render unto the wife due benevolence." The wife is also responsible by the same union covenant to render to her husband "due benevolence."

"Let the husband render unto the wife due benevolence: and likewise also the wife unto the husband" (I Corinthians 7:3).

They are both in the *bonds* of sexual unity: as the wife's body belongs to her husband, so the husband's body belongs to his wife.

"The wife hath not power of her own body, but the husband: and likewise also the husband hath not power of his own body, but the wife" (I Corinthians 7:4).

MARITAL FRAUD

Because of this "conjugal duty," if the husband or wife denies sexual intimacy, they defraud the other.

"Defraud ye not one the other, except it be with consent for a time, that ye may give yourselves to fasting and prayer; and come together again, that Satan tempt you not for your incontinency" (I Corinthians 7:5).

Noah Webster defines "defraud" as, "To deprive of right ... to withhold wrongfully from another what is due to him."

Our English word "defraud" obviously comes from the root "fraud," which is defined by Webster as, "artifice by which the right or interest of another is injured." For this reason "defraud" (Strong's Greek Lexicon #650, apostereo) is also translated in James 5:4 of the King James Version as "kept back by fraud."

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At the core of the marital covenant is the union of two as one. Central to this union is the sexual *bond* of coitus. This is the meaning of "marriage" – "the act of uniting." Unless prohibited by genuine physical limitations, anything less than consistent sexual union between a husband and wife is a defrauding of the marriage covenant (the promise of physical union).

Much *fraud* takes place in marriage relationships. Many "marriages" could be scripturally declared *fraudulent* – the couple being in a state of fault (*i.e.*, "an omission of that which ought to be done"). Their relationship is merely a pretense of "marriage;" an upscale room-mate arrangement, a social partner – but not a biblical marriage.

Sole Exception

Outside of genuine physical limitations, there is only one scriptural exception for the suspension of regular sexual intercourse between a husband and wife. Consistent conjugal intimacy¹ is to be set aside only for the purpose of "fasting and prayer."

"Defraud ye not one the other, except it be with consent for a time, **that ye may give yourselves to fasting and prayer**; and come together again, that Satan tempt you not for your incontinency" (I Corinthians 7:5).

Clearly stated, "fasting and prayer" is the **only** biblical purpose for not actively engaging in martial sexuality. No other reason is given.² The principle therefore is quite simple: no sex, no food; no intercourse, no eating. I would dare say that if many couples followed this scriptural principle they would already be dead from starvation!

FASTING AND PRAYER

This *fasting* is not for medical or health reasons, for it is coupled with "*prayer*" – "*fasting and prayer*." This is fasting associated with prayer. This type of scriptural fasting is a response to overwhelming grief, sorrow, and heaviness – all an atmosphere of a burdened soul.

- There is no legalistic rule of frequency; an innate interval being established by the nature of the couple, and even then with degrees of ebb and flow.
- 2. Paul does not even validate the Mosaic Law's prohibition of sexual relations during the menstrual period. This ceremonial "uncleanness" has been done away by the death of the Lord Jesus Christ.

They are in mutual harmony – "with consent." They have agreed to devote themselves to working through their trials by giving their attentions to spiritual rather than physical matters. They will take the time that they usually spend in eating and intercourse and apply it to their struggles. This would be such a natural process for situations of extreme circumstances; but this unique time that they share together before the Lord is only to be "for a time." The expression of their sexual intimacy will be resumed at the same time as their dietary life is reinstated. There is a clear correlation between the need and pleasure of eating and that of sex.

MUTUAL CONSENT

"Defraud ye not one the other, **except it be with consent** for a time, that ye may give yourselves to fasting and prayer; and come together again, that Satan tempt you not for your incontinency" (I Corinthians 7:5).

This abstinence for the purpose of "fasting and prayer" is to take place **only** by mutual consent. Both the husband and wife are to be in agreement to this purpose.

FOR A TIME

"Defraud ye not one the other, except it be with consent **for a time**, that ye may give yourselves to fasting and prayer; and come together again, that Satan tempt you not for your incontinency" (I Corinthians 7:5).

Not only is this "fasting and prayer" and sexual abstinence to be by reciprocal approval, it is also to be for **only** a limited, agreed-upon period of time – "for a time."

Even in the most extreme trials of agony, there comes a time to raise up from the sorrow and continue with life. This can be seen in the life of King David who, after his grieving process at the death of his young son, it is written:

"Then David arose from the earth, and washed,

and anointed himself, and changed his apparel ... and he did eat" (II Samuel 12:20).

COME TOGETHER AGAIN

"Defraud ye not one the other, except it be with consent for a time, that ye may give yourselves to fasting and prayer; and **come together again**, that Satan tempt you not for your incontinency" (I Corinthians 7:5).

At the end of the mutually agreed upon period of time dedicated to "fasting and prayer," the couple are to "come together again." The word here translated "come" in the King James Version is Strong's Greek Lexicon #4905 sunerchomai, meaning "cohabit (conjugally)."

The word "again," Strong's Greek Lexicon #3825 palin, is defined as "oscillatory repetition." Webster defines oscillatory as "moving backward and forward like a pendulum; swinging; as an oscillatory motion,"³

This entire passage on the marital relationship is exceptionally plain: the consummated husband/wife union is to function on the basis of a continuous state of marriage (the uniting as "one flesh").

Violating these principles places the believer in a state of rebellion to God's most basic marital foundation. Other than for this rare exception of "fasting and prayer," there is no place for sexual abstinence in the life of the married believer. Operating "marriage" in such abstinence is a contraction of terms; it is an oxymoron, denying the very biblical meaning of "marriage." Couples living in such a state of fraud are breaking their marriage covenant – they are marital covenant breakers.

Intimacy of sexual relationship is designed by God to be the great *bond* of joy between husband and wife. This is not just a physical issue, but a spiritual one as well. Its importance and value are to be protected at all lengths – "that Satan tempt you not for your incontinency."

THE ORIGIN OF YOUR ACTIVITY

It is not the *nature* of what you are doing that determines its spirituality, but the *origin* of what you are doing. Not its nature, but its origin!

There was never a moment in the life of the Lord Jesus that was without divine significance, because there was never anything He did, never anything He said, never any step He took which did not spring from a divine origin – nothing that was not the activity of the Father in and through the Son. Thirty-three years of availability to the Father, that the Father in and through Him might

implement the program that had been established and agreed on between the Father and the Son before ever the world was.

Why did the Father give all things into His hands? Because Jesus Christ was completely Man. And He was completely Man because He was completely available! For the first time since Adam fell into sin, there was on earth a Man as God intended man to be!

Which of His activities were the more spiritual, the Sermon on the Mount, the raising of Lazarus from the dead, or the washing of His disciples' feet? The answer, of course, is that no one activity was more spiritual than another, for all had their origin in the Father, who acted through the Son. "I do always those things that please Him" (John 8:29).

The Lord Jesus summarized this in John 14:10 –

"Believest thou not that I am in the Father, and the Father is in Me? The words that I speak unto you I speak not of myself; but the Father that dwelleth in Me, He doeth the works."

The whole activity of the Lord Jesus on earth as Man was the Father's activity in the Son, through the eternal Spirit through whom His body was presented to the Father.

Spirituality in man is his availability to God for His divine action, and the *form* of this activity is irrelevant. If it pleases you, always and only, to do what pleases God you can do as you please!

THE MEASURE OF CHRIST

"Which He wrought in Christ, when He raised Him from the dead, and set Him at His own right hand in heavenly places, far above all principality, and power, and might, and dominion, and every name that is named, not only in this world, but also in

that which is to come: and hath put all things under His feet, and gave Him to be the head over all things to the church, which is His body, the fulness of Him that filleth all in all" (Ephesians 1:20-23).

We want immediately to focus everything in and upon the Lord Jesus Christ, for it is HE who is in view. What we have before us these days is not teaching or truth – that is, to be possessed with more knowledge of truth; it is not service; but it is the LORD Himself.

The object of the Father from first to last is that the Son, the Lord Jesus, shall fill all things ... and all things shall be filled with Christ. The value of everything in the eyes of God is according to the measure of the manifestation of Christ in it. It is from that standpoint that God determines the value of the thing. How much of the Lord Jesus is manifested through it – that determines the value of a thing. How much of the Lord Jesus is manifested through it ... determines the value from God's standpoint.

If we got focused there, it would make a great difference; much would have to go, because of manifesting something other than the Lord Jesus.

We must understand that the Father has set the Lord Jesus before His eyes, and the Father's eyes are full of only one object – the Beloved, His Son. In the eyes of God the value of everything is determined by the measure in which His Son is manifested and glorified; that is His end, and that is His object ...

God has singled out a Person and gathered into that Person all the Divine perfections. Everything is inseparably bound up with His Son. He has put all the fullness of the Universe into that Person and bound up all the fullness in Him. Not a fragment can be had apart from Him; that which is to characterize the New Creation is in Him. The predestined End of God is a full presentation of the fullness of Christ – every corner of the Universe speaking audibly of Jesus Christ – so that we shall not be able to go into a place or touch a life

without finding an expression of the Lord Jesus.

"Christ in you, the hope of glory" – this is heaven. You walk in the presence of the Lord Jesus Christ. Think of the whole Universe like that – a universal expression of His Son in fullness. That is the end God has in view – that Christ shall fill all things ... a looking into everything will mean finding it full of Christ ...

The Christian life is not by effort and not by struggle – not merely trying to put into practice certain maxims or to attain to a certain measure; but from beginning to end and altogether, it is a matter of knowing the Lord Jesus within. Of course, this implies response to Him and a continual yieldedness to His working within by His Spirit – so cooperating with Him in His purpose of conformity to the image of His Son.

CHRIST OUR LIFE

"When Christ, Who is our life, shall appear, then shall ye also appear with Him in glory" (Colossians 3:4).

One of the main objects of the Holy Spirit is to get believers really identified with Christ as the risen and exalted Lord, and to make His risen life real in their experience. As the age moves toward its consummation – the appearing of Christ – two features will become increasingly evident. On the one hand things, men, movements, institutions, organizations, etc., will predominate and draw multitudes after them, and will attach the crowds to themselves. On the other hand, with a growing disappointment and disillusionment over these, a minority will turn to the Lord Himself to find Him alone as their life.

Three elements will inhere in all this. One is the unmistakable development of the principle of Antichrist; that which will definitely supplant Christ, or intend to do so. The second is the alternative to the whole Christ in man-made Christianity,

an imitation life born and carried on by its own momentum. The third, a deep and genuine quest for reality, truth, and inward knowledge of the Lord Himself. In the first case it will be the naked worship of man in human power: a tremendous overflow of humanism, the wonder and glory of man. The third will be Christ altogether as the life.

If the Christian is attached to some thing, such as a teaching, a tradition, an institution, a movement or person, the end will certainly be a limitation of life and eventually confusion and disappointment, perhaps worse. Paul makes it unmistakably clear and emphatic that the destiny of all is to be Christ "all, and in all." We must learn that a true work of the Spirit of God is to attach everything to Christ Himself. He, Christ, must be the life of our spirit, the "inner man," so that we are strong in the Lord: not in ourselves, not in others, nor in things. We shall have to survive adversity by His strength within alone.

It is the Lord Himself, and for this to be so, it often has to be against a background of natural inability. The power of His resurrection is the law of union with Christ from beginning to end. Days of terrific pressure are upon the Lord's people. Their enemy is taking very little off-time. The only sufficiency is in the Lord Himself as our life.

Barnabas exhorted the believers that "with purpose of heart they would cleave unto the Lord" (Acts 11:23). There is an utterness about this that will be pressed upon us until the time "when Christ, Who is our life, shall appear."

THE TREE OF THE KNOWLEDGE OF GOOD AND EVIL

The Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil is a powerful Biblical model of the Law. As the Apostle Paul declared, "The strength of sin is the law" (I Corinthians 15:56). This is because it is through the Law that we derive our knowledge of good

and evil. We may wonder how this knowledge brings death until we see the fruit. The knowledge causes us to focus our attention upon ourselves. Sin is empowered by the law; not just because the evil is revealed but the good as well. It drives us either to corruption or self-righteousness, both of which lead to death ...

The good of the Tree of Knowledge has always been more effective in separating us from the Lord than the evil has been. The goodness of man can be the most ugly manifestation of his pride and rebellion against God. The entire Tree of Knowledge must be torn from our soul by the roots ...

Sin is not just a few wrong things we have done; it is the nature of what we are [were] – regardless of whether the guise is good or evil ... Paul clearly articulates this in his letter to the church at Philippi (Philippians 3:2-9).

Paul's righteousness based upon the Law brought him into direct conflict with the Truth. He was a persecutor of true worshipers, as is everyone who tries to live by the law. Just as Cain could not tolerate Abel, those who seek to stand by their own righteousness find the presence of those who stand by faith in Jesus intolerable. The righteousness of God, based completely on the atonement of the cross, strips away facades and lays bare the pride of man... When he [Paul] perceived the righteousness of Jesus, he counted everything that he has so valued in life as rubbish

The cross of Jesus utterly destroys every selfrighteous presumption. There is no greater intimidation to the knowledge of good and evil than the cross.

OUR BODIES

Tragically, some dismiss the intricacies of the human body for fear that we might become overly fond of it. Centuries of old Puritan and Victorian practices have stained the intention of our Creator, marking the body as the enemy of the spiritual life. But no such thing is true. Our body was elaborately fashioned by God, created as the dwelling place where ... [we] reside with Him.
