he church today is called to "shine as lights in the world" (Philippians 2:15). We are to "do all things without murmurings and disputings" (Philippians 2:14) and to have it in our hearts and minds to keep "reaching forth unto those things which are before" us (Philippians 3:13) – promises that are assuredly ours. This is our "high calling of God in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:14) and, if we are to be effective servants, it requires that we approach life with *enlightened eyes* of understanding.

We have been called by God and are being utilized by having the vocation of being blessed with the gift of being God's "workmanship" right now (Ephesians 2:10), while still clothed in weak corrupt bodies.

The mature servant needs to understand what God is doing today. He needs to understand who all of the participants are, and where their destiny lies. The mature servant of the Lord needs to know the individual roles of creation, and when their roles are to be played out. The mature servant needs to understand our promises; he needs to know why and how God is fulfilling His will by including and utilizing our predestined participation.

The reason we should seek after God to the

end of better learning His will, is because we know that everything is in His control. I've heard it said that *nothing has ever* just occurred to God. This is true, for He not only created the physical matter, but He also has sovereignty over it all. He is in control of everything that has ever happened from the very onset. Everything. 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destined end. This is not a fatalistic outlook by any means, rather it is reverently acknowledging His authority. It is the basis for understanding what our true vocation is, as we now know what our predestined fulfilling role is as members of the church that is destined to serve in Heaven.

O the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable are His judgments, and His ways past finding out! For of Him, and through Him, and to Him, are all things: to Whom be glory for ever. Amen. (Romans 11:33, 36).

Equipped with this God-given enlightenment, the effective servant of the Lord is able to press on with the correct finish-line goal in his heart and mind. The servant of the Lord now knows the: what, why, how, who, when and especially now the full extent of the where found in Scriptures' edification process; these are the things that make up each predestined vocation.

We today enjoy the benefit of having the "fulfilled" (i.e., "completed") Word of God available to us (Colossians 1:25). Understanding and growing in Scripture matures the faithful servant of the Lord, and this maturity tempers the servant of the Lord.

As Paul had previously taught,

I have never liked the thought of hurting others. Especially within the context of their current belief and level of understanding, that which is the basis of their resultant faith. Our influence, within the context of sharing God's Word, is to be gentle and to be ministered by the wisdom of the Word of God, patiently encouraging a fuller understanding of our calling as the Heaven-bound ecclesia who are sealed by the Holy Spirit to that end.



wherewith He loved us, even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ, (by grace ye are saved;) and hath raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus: that in the ages to come He might shew the exceeding riches of His grace in His kindness toward us through Christ Jesus (Ephesians 2:4-7).

God is today using a new called-out body of believers as a witness to all of creation, and especially the celestial beings that make up the "spiritual wickedness in high places" (Ephesians 6:12) – a living organism of believers bearing witness of His power, wisdom and grace to overcome evil with good. He made a show of this victory of good over evil at Calvary, a far-reaching victory that has not only paved the way for the conciliation of the Earth, but also the Heavenly places.

There are many examples in Scripture of supernatural good overcoming supernatural evil within the context of seemingly insurmountable odds:

- David and Goliath (I Samuel 17:1-58);
- The Red Sea crossing (Exodus 14:1-31);
- Daniel and the den of lions (Daniel 6:1-28);
- Elisha prayed for his servant to see the spiritual protection that God sent (II Kings 6:14-17).

These expressed-within-the-Word-of-God examples of good overcoming evil showcase His intervention and absolute authority over each situation. They also imprint the lesson upon the called saint of how He alone is accomplishing His will. For the ecclesia destined to reign as joint-heirs with Christ in the Heavenly places it is especially true.

It really is beyond our grasp to fully understand the nature or magnitude of the principalities, powers, mights and dominions that occupy the Heavenly places. These celestial beings are obscured from our visible daily experience as we live out our current existence within the confines of the physics of our three-dimensional comprehension. We rely upon the brief glimpses in Scripture of the duties, capabilities, strengths and limitations of the immortal celestial beings. What is sure is that they exist and are superior to, and much more powerful than, mortal humanity.

For example, we read in Scripture that in one night one angel defeated 185,000 Assyrian solders:

"For I will defend this city, to save it, for Mine own sake, and for My servant David's sake." And it came to pass that night, that the angel of the *Lord went out, and smote in the camp of the As*syrians an hundred fourscore and five thousand: and when they arose early in the morning, behold, they were all dead corpses (II Kings 19:34-35).

Here are a few more examples of the existence and strength of celestial beings:

- Balaam sees the celestial entity (Numbers 22:31);
- Cherubim guard the tree of life (Genesis 3:23-24);
- Daniel is visited by Gabriel (Daniel 9:21-22).

Without Form and Void: A Study of the Meaning of Genesis 1:2

Considered a classic in Christian apologetics, this scholarly analysis of the biblical phrase "without form and void," from the opening chapter of Genesis, observes the rules of linguistics, grammar and syntax, and also examines how words are used in the rest of Scripture. This book has been described as the best argument that has ever been written for the Gap Theory.

A well respected Canadian scientist, and listed in the 1971 American Men in Science, Dr. Custance contends that we should not allow science to determine what Scripture says. Neither should we allow Scripture to determine what the scientist observes in the laboratory. Yet observed fact in the one cannot, ultimately, conflict with revealed fact in the other. Any conflict, then, is in the interpretation of the facts – not in the facts themselves.

The reason that a consideration of the celestial beings is especially important for the saints today is that our vocation, as joint-heirs with Christ, literally has to do with the oversight of the heavenly places.

The eyes of your understanding being enlightened; that ye may know what is the hope of His calling, and what the riches of the glory of His inheritance in the saints, and what is the exceeding greatness of His power to us-ward who believe, according to the working of His mighty power, Which He wrought in Christ, when He raised Him from the dead, and set Him at His own right hand in the heavenly places, far above all principality, and power, and might, and dominion, and every name that is named, not only in this world, but also in that which is to come: and hath put all things under His feet, and gave Him to be the Head over all things to the church, which is His body, the fulness of Him that filleth all in all (Ephesians 1:18-23).

Stop and let that sink into the vision you have of your future. Consider Paul's words within the vocational context of God having chosen you, having predestined you, having made you a joint-heir with Christ to dwell and reign with Him far above all of these immortal, celestial beings. You, in all of your current mortal weakness, are the chosen to be seated with Christ far above all authorities in the heavenly places. I pray that our loving heavenly Father will give, unto each who reads this, enlightened eyes of understanding with which to grasp a glimpse of the

glory that awaits the called, spotless, blameless and Heaven-bound saints. Today our called vocation is to comprise the church that is the fulfilling-body of our Head, the Lord Jesus Christ, to be seated there with Him in the glory of the conciliated heavenly places.

Charles Baker wrote a book in 1937 entitled "God's Clock of the Ages." The work was a defense of creation in light of the imposition that science and evolution were making at the time on Scripture's testimony of God's handiwork of creation. It was based on the twelve hours on a typical clock. Mr. Baker correctly identifies a significant amount of time that elapsed between Genesis 1:1 and 1:2, understanding that this gap serves as better support for creation and the absolute authority of God.

The original creation in Genesis 1:1 has to do with the heavenly places and those celestial beings that were created to occupy them. The extensive lapse of time that separates the original cosmos from the habitat for humanity established in Eden's garden (:3-31) simply further testifies to the sovereignty of the great "I Am" of Scripture. It is in total support of the understanding and belief of creation by the hand of our sovereign God. It also aligns with the references in Scripture to the interference of the "sons of God" (ancient celestials) prior to the judgement of Noah's time (Genesis 6:1-4), those who gathered (celestial heavenly powers) to give an account to God when He used the man Job as a witness of faithfulness against them (Job 1:6; 2:1), and the demonic activity (spiritual wickedness as an evil contrast) in Scripture.

These celestial beings are fearfully powerful in contrast to the weakness of humanity. Our promise as joint-heirs with Christ, and possessing a body fashioned like unto His, is to be far above them when we literally dwell in heavenly places at the appearing of Christ in glory. Understand that this assured future glory is a witness that we are living out right now in mortal weakness. This is our ministry as those who are sealed by God and destined for the highest Heaven.

Are you beginning to better understand why God has promised you a new body? Are you beginning to understand what it means to say, "I'm going to heaven when resurrected in Christ"? Can you now see how Paul could say, "For me to live is Christ, and to die is gain"? A more accurate translation of Philippians 1:21 states "For me to be living is Christ, and to be dying, is gain" and better reveals the true intention in Paul's heart. The thought in this passage comes from the Apostle's goal to do everything in service to Christ. If he lived, he was actively serving Christ, but he also knew, in dying as a martyr, his death would further the gospel. Therefore, he concludes that remaining in service here was more profitable for those to whom he ministered, although he preferred neither evangelizing or a martyr's death. Rather, he preferred to be together with Christ knowing that at His appearing (when we as Christ's Body appear with Him) things will be far better for all. Paul lived from a heart that understood how brief our current life is, and how glorious our assured future is.

Are you starting to catch a vision of how we have only just begun to fulfill our destiny when we live out our brief existence down here on earth? I hope that you

are, because even now we are commissioned to think in terms of already possessing this standing in Christ while pressing on as living testimonies of our new identity and hope.


Consider these insightful passages in light of the understanding of the ancient cosmos, the original creation that the ancient celestial beings continue to inhabit; our future position will be far above them in the highest heaven:

- Paul was caught up into paradise (II Corinthians 12:1-5);
- For our citizenship is in *Heaven* (Philippians 3:20);
- Set your affection on things *above* (Colossians 3:2).

Think of the ancient example and experience of Job as his destiny was on full display to the celestial beings that had congregated in council with God.

Now there was a day when the sons of God came to present themselves before the LORD, and Satan came also among them. And the LORD said unto Satan, "Whence comest thou?" Then Satan answered the LORD, and said, "From going to and fro in the earth and from walking up and down in it." And the LORD said unto Satan, "Hast thou considered my servant Job, that there is none like him in the earth, a perfect and an upright man, one that feareth God, and escheweth evil?" (Job 1:6-8).

In a similar way, our brief lives are being lived out as examples of the power, wisdom and grace of God to utilize us within the context of His victory over evil; victory that reaches the entirety of creation. We have only just begun as we complete our brief mortal experience in this current life. We will all find ourselves,



Will We Escape Death?

If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men most miserable (I Corinthians 15:19).


We have been programmed to think in terms of escaping death by way of the rapture instead of resting in the assurance of resurrection from sure death. This is sad, for the surety of hope, for all who are presently in Christ, is a clear understanding of our heavenly destiny and duty as joint-heirs with Him. The best way to overcome this roll-of-the-dice thinking that we are going to be a generation that will not have to face literal death, an assurance that no one to date has been able to claim as a literally experienced promise, is to have your understanding enlightened to our glorious calling. The fulfilling of Scripture with the revelation of the far reach of Calvary throughout the heavenly places, and our joint-heirship with Christ there in those heavenly places, is your certain promise.

As the old hymn states, "... the things of this Earth grow strangely dim in the light of His glory and grace ..." to us.


